 • To show that the money we pay for a product is not fairly shared among those people involved in bringing it to us.

what you need
 Batch of flowers (optional); copy of grid, without figures in the 'Actual proportion' column, flowers with a Rip-Start, copies of Role Cards.

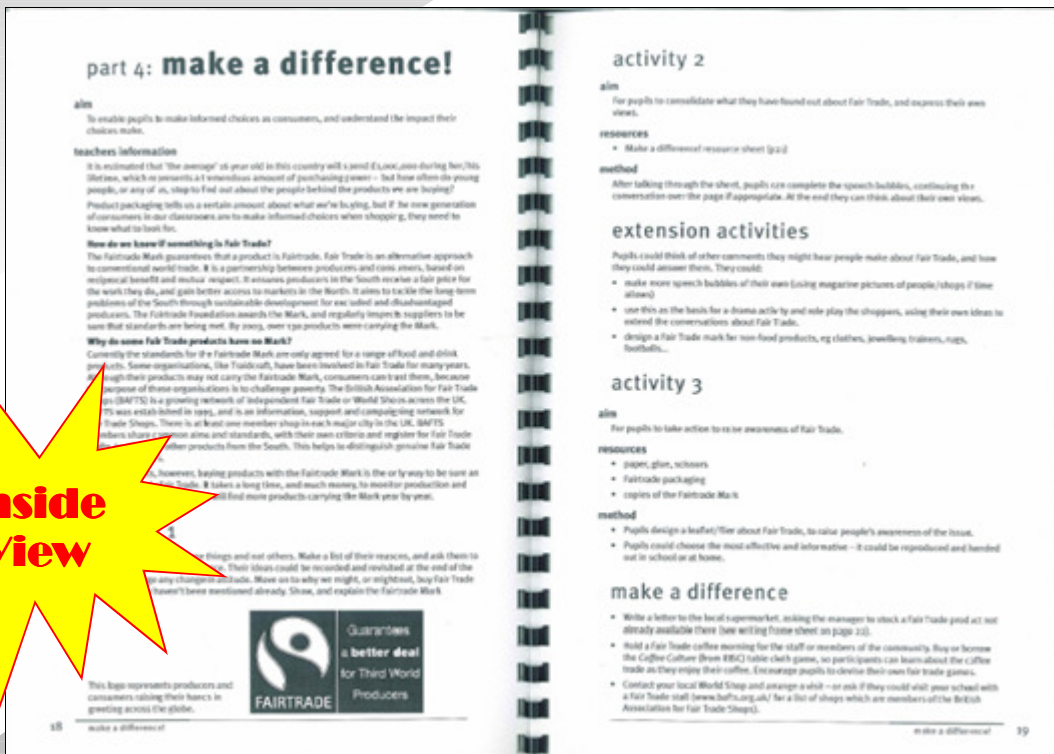

- what you do**
- Introduction: 80% of world's cut flowers are produced in the South. Who are the different groups of people involved in getting a flower to you? Write on flip-chart in form of a chain and add any missing (eg. workers, growers, importers, wholesaler, retailers, consumers).
 - Divide participants into 4 groups which represent links in the chain and give out Role Cards.
 - Ask one person from each group to read their Role Card to the whole group. (Each group has five minutes to think about their role. How do they feel about it? What sort of problems might they face? What strengths/weaknesses do they have in the market for cut flowers?)
 - Explain that the flowers will be sold at a branch in Britain. Each group has to decide how much of the selling price they should get (the 'Consumer' group has a slightly different role). This should not be a discussion about how much the growers think people do get, but rather how much it due to them for the work that they do, and the value they take.
 - Ask each group to tell the others how much they think they should get. Record in the 'Initial Proportion' column. The 'Consumer' group asks questions to make each group justify their claims.
 - Add up the total (it's likely to be much more than £2).
 - Ask whole group to negotiate distribution of income, with the 'Consumer' group writing on negotiations. Record in 'Negotiated proportion'.
 - Write on the 'Actual proportion' figure.

“Bananas & Cocoa Beans”

The activities in this pack are designed to help students understand the global nature of trade, and why the poor aren't feeling its benefits. By helping students develop positive actions and responses, it also helps ensure their desire for change is accompanied by proactivism, rather than defeatism.

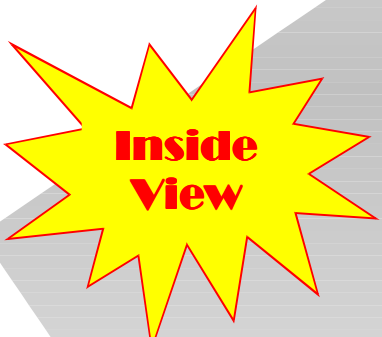
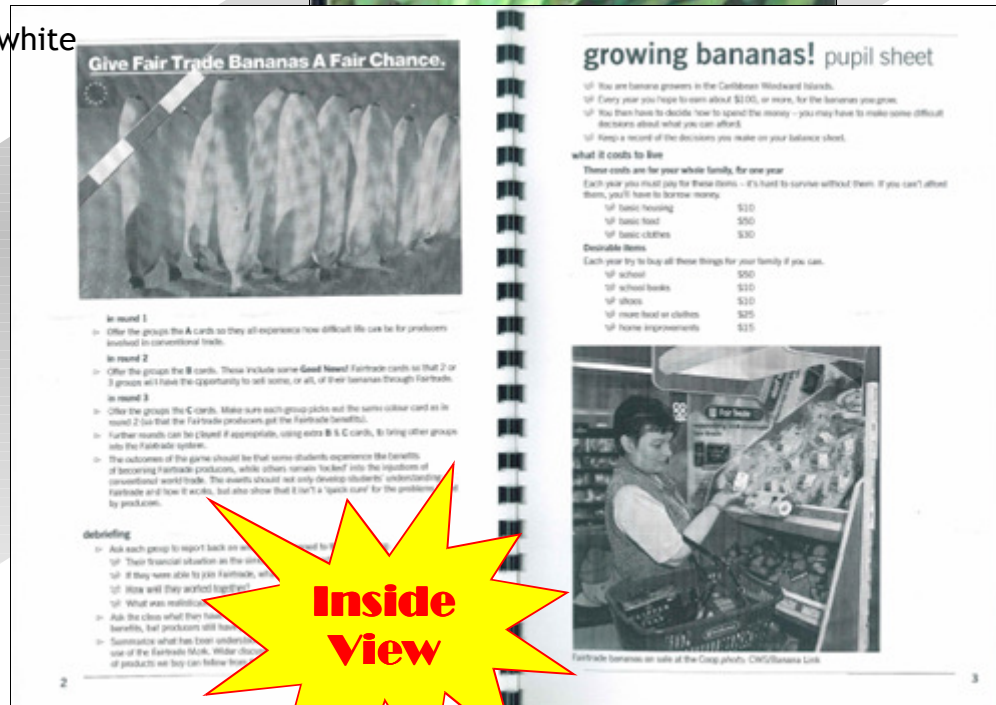
